The \$ Thing:

Phase 1— Initially, a \$500 grant was awarded in 1995 to begin the conversion of the school's courtyard. A pond was installed as part of this grant.

Phase 2— This school was also awarded \$3000 from the OCSCD Partnership Grant in 1996 to continue the development of habitats in the courtyard.


- Year 1—Install Hummingbird & Wildflower Gardens
- Year 2—Install Butterfly Garden and add benches
- Year 3—Add Rock Paths, a Rock Garden, Bird baths and more Benches.
